ABOUT US

Amherst Glebe Arts Response, Inc. (AGAR) is a Virginia 501(c)3 non-profit organization. Our mission is to bring, commission, and develop and present programs in arts, humanities, local history, arts education, and arts in healthcare to Amherst County and beyond.

Our Chamber Music Series of early music began in 2011. AGAR has presented Amherst Java & Jazz with Second Stage | Amherst since 2018. AGAR commissioned an opera, "Romania: Revolution 1989" by Aaron Garber, a play by Royal Shiree, and a string quartet by Ray Weidner. We received three NEA "Big Read" grants for the community to read Emily Dickinson, Joy Harjo, and Zora Neale Hurston. In August we co-presented "Nightcaps" a new opera by Virginians Brooke Vandervelde and Richard Rose. In 2022-2023 we presented three concerts on L. M. Gottschalk (1829-1869), and with Early Music Access Project Charlottesville a concert of music as played by 19th-century Monticello free and enslaved black fiddlers. With grants from Chamber Music America we fought COVID-19 stress by live streaming virtual jazz concerts for hospital staff. Virginia Humanities funded AGAR's films on attending schools in Amherst Co. 1915-1975. In 2022, AGAR produced with MINCF a project on Monacan poet/scholar Karenne Wood.
